

Client-Therapist Contract: Equine Assisted Psychotherapy with ClearWind Farm, LLC

Outpatient Services Contract

Welcome to our practice. This document contains important information about our professional services and business policies. Please read it carefully and jot down any questions you might have so that we can discuss them at our next meeting. When you sign this document, it will represent an agreement between us.

Psychological Services

Equine Assisted Psychotherapy (EAP) is an emerging field that uses horse-human interactive experiences to facilitate emotional growth and learning. It is a collaborative effort between a licensed therapist and a horse professional working with the clients and horses to address treatment goals. Participants learn about themselves and others by participating in activities with the horses, and then processing (or discussing) feelings, behaviors, and patterns. The focus of EAP is not riding or horsemanship. In fact, 100 percent of EAP takes place purely on the ground. The focus of EAP involves setting up activities involving the horses that require the client or group to apply certain skills as they interact with the horses.

Any kind of psychotherapy can have benefits and risks. Since therapy often involves coming into contact with unpleasant aspects of your life, you may experience uncomfortable feelings like sadness, guilt, anger, frustration, loneliness and helplessness. On the other hand, psychotherapy has also been shown to lead to better relationships, solutions to specific problems, and significant reductions in feelings of distress. What you get out of therapy is based partly on what you put into it, your willingness to go to those places that are difficult. But there are no guarantees of what you will experience or get out of it.

Our first session or two will provide an opportunity for you to become familiar with the horses, Suzanne (equine specialist) and Matt (therapist), and this unusual therapeutic approach. It will also help clarify your strengths, and those areas you would like to address with the horses. We will then begin to tailor sessions to meet your goals. Most clients find that they get the most benefit from this approach in between 6 and 12 sessions. We recommend using equine assisted psychotherapy as an adjunct with traditional in-office therapy (we are happy to communicate with other clinicians as you request.)

Therapy involves a large commitment of time, money, and energy, so you should be very careful about the therapist and therapeutic modality you select. If you have questions about my procedures, we should discuss them whenever they arise. If your doubts persist, we will be happy to help you set up a meeting with another mental health professional for a second opinion.

Sessions

Sessions run for 50 to 60 minutes. Once an appointment is scheduled, you will be expected to pay for it unless you provide 24 hours advance notice of cancellation unless we both agree that you were unable to attend due to circumstances beyond your control.

Professional Fees, Billing and Payments

Our hourly fee for Equine Assisted Psychotherapy is \$140. We do offer a sliding fee scale for people on moderate incomes. Additional services – talking to teachers, consulting with physicians, writing reports – are billed at the same rate, and will be agreed upon before services are rendered. You will be expected to pay for each session at the time it is held, unless we agree otherwise. In circumstances of unusual financial hardship, we may be willing to negotiate a fee adjustment or payment installment plan. We accept cash and checks, and charge a \$20 service fee for returned checks.

If your account has not been paid for more than 60 days and arrangements for payment have not been agreed upon, we have the option of using legal means to secure payment. This may involve hiring a collection agency or going through small claims court. If such legal action is necessary, our legal costs will be included in the claim. In most collection situations, the only information we release regarding a client's treatment is his/her name, the nature of the services provided, and the amount due.

Insurance Reimbursement

We are not currently on any insurance panels and are not equipped to file insurance forms on your behalf. We will provide a receipt of services that you can use to file with your insurance company for out-of-network benefits, if your plan includes that benefit.

Contacting Us

Please call Matt on his cell phone, 336-775-7881, regarding any matter. He checks messages regularly and will get back to you just as soon as he is able. Be sure to leave your phone number when you call. If you are unable to reach Matt and feel that you can't wait for a return call, contact your family physician or the nearest emergency room and ask for the mental health clinician on call. If Matt will be unavailable for an extended time, he will provide you with the name and number of a colleague to contact, if necessary.

Professional Records

You should be aware that, pursuant to HIPAA, we may keep Protected Health Information about you in two sets of professional records. One set constitutes your Clinical Record. It includes information about your reasons for seeking therapy, a description of the ways in which your problem impacts your life, your diagnosis, the goals that are set for treatment, your progress towards those goals, your medical and social history, your treatment history, any past treatment, reports of any professional consultations, your billing records, and any reports that have been sent to anyone, including reports to your insurance carrier. Except in unusual circumstances that involve danger to your self and/or others or the record makes reference to another person (unless such other person is a health provider) and we believe that access is reasonably likely to cause substantial harm to such other person, you may examine and/or receive a copy.

Confidentiality

In general, the law protects the privacy of all communications between a client and a psychotherapist, and we can release information about our work to others only with your written permission. But there are a few exceptions.

- A judge can order my testimony in a court proceeding.
- If we believe a child or elder is being abused, we are obligated by law to report it to the appropriate state agency.
- If a client is threatening serious bodily harm to another, we are required to take protective action.
- If a client threatens to harm himself or herself, we are obligated to contact family, friends, the police or the hospital to ensure the client's safety.

Confidentiality Issues With Minors

When parents bring in their child for treatment, they are understandably curious about their child's progress and parental involvement is often crucial to successful treatment. Parents have the right to request and receive information about their child's mental condition, diagnosis, treatment needs and services provided.

It is our belief, however, that young people need to develop trust in their counselor and need some degree of privacy. We ask parents to respect this privacy and refrain from asking us about the details of their child's/children's treatment. If parents request it, we will provide general information about how treatment is proceeding. We will inform parents as soon as possible if we believe there is a high risk that their child will seriously harm herself/himself or someone else. Before giving parents any information, we will attempt to discuss it, if possible, with the child and we will do my best to handle any objections she/he may have.

Patient Rights

HIPPA provides you with several new or expanded rights with regard to your clinical records and disclosures of protected health information. These rights include requesting that your provider amend your records; requesting restrictions on what information from your Clinical Records is disclosed to others; requesting an accounting of most disclosures of protected health information that you have neither consented to nor authorized; determining the location to which protected information disclosures are sent; having any complaints you make about my policies and procedures recorded in your records; and the right to review and copy your records. We will be happy to discuss any of these rights with you. These rights are explained further in the Privacy Notice.

Complaints

If you have a complaint about our services to you or your child, we encourage you to speak honestly with us about it first. If you still feel we have acted unprofessionally, unethically or illegally, we encourage you to contact the NC Board of Licensed Professional Counselors, the agency which awarded Matt his counselor license (#4828).
